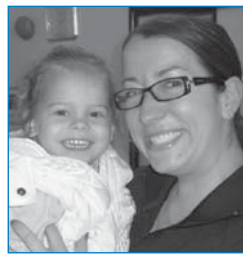

A Spiritual Awakening

Walk with Jesus retreat described as 'mountaintop experience'

On April 9-11, students of the Southwest Center for Higher Independence (SCH) at Methodist Mission Home (MMH) came together for a weekend of spiritual support during the 14th Annual Walk with Jesus retreat.

Walk with Jesus is a transformational three-day event designed to provide students with the opportunity to talk about Jesus and learn how having a relationship with Him will impact their lives.

Along with MMH Chaplain Carol Williams, other spiritual advisors including Methodist church members and former Chaplain Gina Symons were on hand to answer students' questions, provide information, and participate in discussions and activities.

"The students related to a lot of the topics we talked about on spirituality," said Williams who had volunteered at the event before, but joins the retreat this year for the first time as MMH Chaplain. "I love seeing the students grow from this. It's a mountaintop experience for many of them."

According to the radio show "Faith Matters," the term "mountaintop experience" comes from the Book of Luke in the Bible where Jesus went up on a mountain with three of his closest followers, Peter, James and John. While there, Jesus "transfigures" or changes in appearance. The event is said to have been an intense, life-shaping experience that fed the faith of all three men.

Established in 1974, SCHI was founded as a transitional education center for people who are

deaf and hard of hearing. Today, SCHI has expanded to serve more diverse disabilities including cerebral palsy and autism. For more than 30 years, SCHI has assisted hundreds of young adults with disabilities to learn the vocational and life skills they need to achieve their personal level of independence.

Twenty students participated in this year's Walk with Jesus retreat. On the first day, Williams said the students learned about their new friend Jesus and participated in an exercise where they carried a rock symbolizing "burden" to the cross at the outdoor chapel.

"The exercise taught the students that they don't have to be weighed down by bad things in their lives," Williams said. "Jesus is there for them. He is knocking at their door. It's up to us to open it for him."

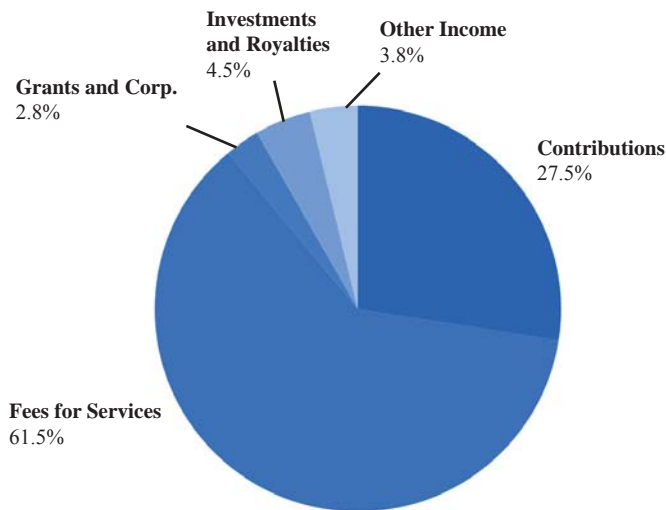

Church donations by Conference*

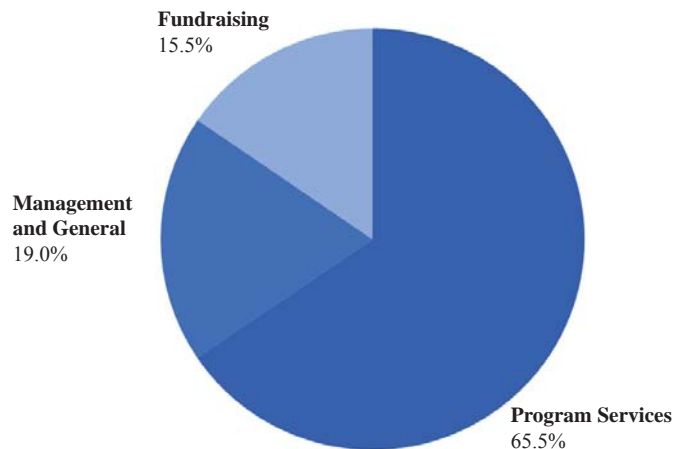

2009 YEAR IN REVIEW

■ Adoption Services served 175 pregnant teens and young women inquiring about adoption; 40 enrolled as birth mothers; 19 resided in our Maternity Center. Twenty babies and children were placed with loving adoptive families through Domestic Infant, International and Older Child adoptions. Three hundred thirty-eight adoptive families were served.

■ Post-adoption services were provided to 390 adult adoptees, adoptive parents, birth parents and other relatives.

■ Adoption Education and Outreach services provided more than 509 families, at-risk youth, healthcare professionals, teens and young women with information about adoption.

■ Southwest Center for Higher Independence (SCHI) provided transitional education, including life and vocational skills to 74 young adults with disabilities. SCHI students work to overcome

barriers and achieve their personal level of independent living.

■ Generations of Promise, our campaign for the future, raised 3,742,805 toward our goal of 6,750,000 for campus renovations and endowment. Renovations began on the SCHI Dormitory in February, 2009. Our endowment fund raised 765,562 of our \$1 million goal.

■ The Genesis Cooperative, a self-supporting collaborative of five non-profits located on the MMH campus, hosted campus activities including Easter and Thanksgiving church services and a Christmas Celebration for women recovering from substance abuse and their children, adults who are deaf/ blind, SCHI students with disabilities and pregnant teens and young women.

■ In collaboration with San Antonio Food Bank, we provided basic culinary training to 10 SCHI students opening the door to a job in a commercial kitchen.

Cherish the Journey

The Turturros were blessed with a baby through adoption at Methodist Mission Home

Adoption was always something Philip and Samantha Turturro hoped to do in their lives. When they were referred to Methodist Mission Home (MMH) in 2008, they were thankful to receive accurate expectations right from the start.

“[MMH] told us it could take up to two years to adopt a baby and it took up to two years,” Philip said. “We communicated closely with the agency and the expectations were set at the beginning, so it went very smoothly.”

The adoption journey was an exciting one, says Samantha. They were able to meet a number of birthmothers throughout the process and waited until they found the perfect match. When the Turturros were matched with a birthmother in the summer of 2009, they felt confident it would work out.

“There was excitement and nervousness and all of that,” Samantha said. “[The birthmother] was so certain she was going to place [her baby] for adoption and that we were the family she wanted him to go to. From the beginning I just had a peace about it. It was nice to feel it was going to happen.”

When the Turturros met the birthmother, she was three months pregnant. Over the next six months, they developed a bond with her. Working with the birth mother to develop a cooperative plan, the Turturros shared their thoughts about how they wanted to raise this child.

“There was a really good connection,” Samantha said. “We talked to her on a regular basis and went to all her doctor’s appointments and were there to find out she was going to have a little boy.”

When baby Tommy was born on Dec. 22, 2009, the Turturros were in the delivery room and were the first ones to hold him.

“The first time I got to hold him, which was just minutes after he was born, I just knew that was my son,” Samantha said. “I had an immediate connection with him.”

The idea that a child is a gift from God could not have been any more fitting for the Turturros. They brought Tommy home on Christmas Eve.

“I believe if people seek God and his will when parenting they will make good decisions,” Philip said. “We are believers. We follow God’s word. We know that one of the blessings he has given people is the ability to have children and we wanted

to take part in that blessing and be a part of his plan for families.”

The Turturros are grateful that Tommy’s birthmother made the decision she made. With that decision, Samantha says, come more opportunities for Tommy.

“We realize there are so many blessings to come from bringing a baby into our home through adoption,” Samantha said. “This is a story we will be proud to tell him.”

Philip’s advice to other parents hoping to adopt is to cherish the journey.

“The end result is wonderful, but the journey is what you remember most,” Philip said. “It made us experience and enjoy Tommy more when he got here.”
