





It's breathtaking hearing the stories of my co-laborers. Being a somewhat new-person on the block, lends me a great opportunity to learn about my team. Sometimes, it even feels like I'm listening to angels sing, while they tell me about their beautiful work. and what it means to them. There is so much love, care and compassion that goes into what my co-laborers do that it floods my heart with happiness and sadness all at once. Happiness, because what they do is pure gold and beyond selfless. Sadness, because many of the atrocities our survivors had to go through, no one should ever have to face, but thanks to you, the donor, and the team, we're here to help end the cycle of generational trauma through innovative services.

Francisco Garcia, is our Housing Navigator for Providence Place. What that means is, he does a TON of relationship building with different properties around town and works collaboratively with clients who are experiencing homelessness due to various circumstances, such as abuse, abandonment, and the lack of a positive support system.

Francisco's empathetic ability to fully immerse himself into his work stems from two prongs, his love of helping others, and his personal experience with the bitterness of homelessness, he too once faced. "I know what it feels like to be out there and to have no hope in sight," Francisco continues, "if it was not for my grandmother who found and

rescued me off the streets, I would not be here today."

Francisco made a promise to his grandmother that he would finish his schooling. His grandma made sure that all of his homework was done and that he was attending all of his classes. She believed in him, she was his guiding light. Sometimes that's all we need, just one person to give us a chance, not to give up on us when we have given up on ourselves, someone to believe in us.

Today, Francisco goes out to some of the roughest streets of San Antonio, Texas to find people who are experiencing homelessness, sadness and despair, just as he once was, so long ago. He enables the people he meets with hope, support and uses the same guiding light his grandmother gave to him.

After finding and assisting a 22-yearold young man, by the name of Adam who lived day-to-day in the south Texas scorching heat; Francisco found and arranged a suitable apartment, for Adam to live in and is working with him to improve his overall life. Francisco can smile and reflect, knowing he is helping others help themselves to see the value in who they are and who they have all the potential in the world to be, with a little light.

Alicia and Providence Place colabored together during the time that she was at SIL. While we feel that we are bringing home the harvest, we are not finished.
